Transition Signals

Transition signals are **connecting words and phrases** that link sentences and paragraphs together so that there are **no abrupt jumps or breaks** between your ideas. They also act like **signposts** that indicate to your reader when you are building up to some new idea or thought, or when you are trying to compare ideas or draw conclusions from preceding thoughts.

The following transition signals are grouped according to the **relationship between ideas** that they indicate. Choose words or phrases from each group depending on the type of relationship you wish to describe.

To Introduce an Example:

	especially for example for instance frequently	<i>in this case one example of this is on this occasion specifically</i>	take the case of to demonstrate to illustrate	
To Show Agreement:

To Introduce an Additional Idea:

Note: The transition *besides* can also be used to introduce an additional idea, but *besides* differs from the other transitions in this group because it **excludes**, rather than includes, the previous idea from the new subject. **Ex. "Besides my professor, I cannot think of anyone who has seen my writing.**"

To Indicate Sequence or Order:

after previously first at this point followed by before concurrently afterwards finally second simultaneously at this time meanwhile next

eventually and then third subsequently last ultimately

To Indicate Time:

	after previously at this point at this time before during	afterwards finally formerly immediately initially later	earlier prior to soon then thereafter to this day		
To Compare:

To Contrast:

To Introduce an Opposite Idea or Show Exception:

To Summarize or Conclude:
